Depression following pregnancy loss

- □ Difficult to empathise without experience
- ☐ When an experience is not widely shared with the rest of society, metaphor is often the only tool that people have to communicate with
- □ Intense emotional experiences tend to lead to more creative metaphor

(Gibbs, 2002; Semino, 2011)

Data

- □ Semi-structured 60-90-minute interviews
 - 35 women (and partners) who had experienced miscarriage, termination, and stillbirth
 - 18 people who provide support for the bereaved, the majority of whom had themselves experienced pregnancy loss
 - 18 bereavement midwives
 - 15 funeral directors
- □ Experiences of pregnancy loss, decision-making and communication



Embodied experience

- we're all sort of left with this emptiness inside of us which is very physical as well as emotional
- □ It's not like losing a parent... I've lost grandparents and even friends that have died but it's NOT like that because *it's part of you and he's a part of me.* It's like I lost myself for a long long time and then you have to try and rebuild yourself

The Divided Self

- it'd been several weeks already and that my body hadn't caught on that I'd probably need to have some sort of induction
- The body's obviously very good at keeping hold of babies that it shouldn't do, because it did that four times
- □ I knew my body could do what it had to do



Attitudes towards the body

- My primary feeling, the first feeling was that my body had failed me totally
- There is a whole range of emotions from feeling really angry with my body and myself not knowing that it was happening and for my body for letting me down
- Mine stopped growing at six weeks but I was twelve to thirteen weeks pregnant cause my body hadn't realised that nothing was happening

Conceptions of time

As we watched the seconds turn into hours, days, weeks and even months, things for us felt hopeless.

- It's so hard because you come out of hospital and the world is still carrying on but your world has stopped
- In an instant, the whole world, your family and your life spiral out of your control. You are a bystander to your fate and future, with no power to help your loved ones.
- □ If the world is going round that's the world you know and then when you have a baby that's died you get off; you know the world is still going around and then as time goes on you know you might go round a couple of times and then get off again and get on again... and then gradually you'll get back on but you have to do it at your own pace so it's kind of dipping in and out you know (Midwife)

The compression of time




- A: We've had dad who always wanted beer, and he said I want a can of beer, dad and lad, we've facilitated that

















Metaphor and faith-based abuse They formed a circle around me, with me in the middle and they screamed out at the top of their voices praying ...I had been wearing a coat since I left the house and had been warm so began to take my coat off ... The pastor stopped and asked me what I was doing, and I told him that I was hot and was taking my jacket off. My parents opened their eyes at this point and stared up at the pastor in front of me. Speaking in a language I understood, he asked 'Are you hot? You haven't seen anything yet'. (p. 45) It is significant to note that when Awura Adjoa took her coat off because she was feeling hot, the meaning associated with that Action was one that inadvertently fed into the pastor's conclusion.
